

**Directions:** Answer the following questions (with the exception of number four) in well-written paragraphs (five to eight sentences long).

- 1. Read the entire preface to the novel. L'amour states that "History is not made only by kings and parliaments, presidents, wars, wars and generals. It is a story of people, of their love, honor, faith, hope, and suffering, of hunger thirst and cold, of loneliness and sorrow." In what ways does L'amour back up his claim in the novel? Cite in parentheses the page number and paragraph where you found the information.
- 2. How does Barnabas Sackett (the protagonist) show the virtues of courage, honor, perseverance, temperance, and justice? Cite in parentheses the page number and paragraph where you found the information.
- 3. What is Sackett's true motivation for getting to the America's?
- 4. Name at least ten people or places the novel mentions which are from the time period of 1200 to 1607. America and Great Britain do not count.
- 5. Have two **<u>in-depth discussion questions</u>** written down about Barnabas Sackett's journey from Britain to the new land. Be prepared for a seminar.

\*An in-depth discussion question would not be a yes or no answer question but something that takes time and thought to answer, such as a question you could argue about with fellow classmates in a friendly manner.
